Updates:

In the most recent quarter of 2024, DAS continued its hiring progress, filling vacancies to support apprenticeship program work, grant management, and administrative duties of the DAS.

The 2024-25 State Budget has been finalized, and while all of the state funded grant programs at DAS were proposed to be cut, the final budget included \$40 million in funding restored to DAS grant programs. Of the \$40 million that was restored in the State budget, \$25 million was allocated to youth apprenticeship, and \$15 million was allocated for women in construction.

There was no additional funding allocated for Apprenticeship Innovation Funding (AIF), however of the \$95 allocated to date, we have remaining funds committed to reimburse the costs of apprentices being served in 2024, which will be administered through an application round in early 2025.

Part of the State Budget included reductions for agencies across the board for staffing, and the Labor and Workforce Development Agency is requesting budget information from DAS to potentially reduce the support that DAS receives from the Employment Training Fund by \$2 million, (from \$6.193 million to \$4.193 million) and includes a potential reduction of 10.0 positions in upcoming budget years.

DAS awarded California Opportunity Youth Apprenticeship Grants (COYA) to meet the state's need to boost pre-apprenticeships and apprenticeships that help youth enter and advance in high-quality careers. COYA is investing \$31 million in apprenticeship programs that have the power to uplift opportunity youth across California, including those aged 16-24 who face educational achievement gaps or attend schools in lower-income communities. The funding will support 51 projects across California that pave the way for youth apprentices to succeed. The grants support a network of apprenticeship programs in healthcare, education, advanced manufacturing, information technology, public sector, transportation and more. COYA will also ensure employers are supported and encouraged to hire young workers based on their talent and skills.

The consultants continue to service our existing JACs, UACs and other program sponsors by attending committee meetings, assist with program revisions to comply with the Regulation changes effective Feb. 1, 2024, annual self-assessments, evaluation report compliance, apprentice disciplinary issues, public works compliance and any other advice and assistance needed to continue the successful operation of your apprenticeship programs. Numerous committee reassignments continue to take place and we expect more reassignments to equalize workload and services. In addition, the Los Angeles field office is looking to add one new consultant along with backfilling the vacant Senior Consultant position within the next few months.

Apprenticeship Training Fund Check Processing

ERiCA Grant

The Equal Representation in Construction Apprenticeship (ERiCA) Grant is making significant strides. Grantees are focused on providing vital childcare resources while engaging in outreach and community development efforts. As the second round of invoicing approaches, the DAS has finalized its annual review with the grantees. A thorough assessment of participant reports and narratives concerning the grantees' activities has been conducted by the DAS, which will share its findings with them. The DAS continues to be dedicated to assisting the grantees in reaching their goals.

The active apprentices numbered 71,372 / 92,459.

New registrations and reinstatements numbered **8,040 / 11,352** for the quarter.

Minorities represented 70.4% / 72.2% of all active apprentices.

Active women apprentices numbered **2,533** / **8,406**, which is **3.5%** / **9.1%** of all active apprentices.

There are currently 13,829 / 15,139 veterans active, 2,882 / 3,783 of which registered, and 1,370/ 1,957 completed in 2024.

Program Evaluations April 1, 2024 through June 30, 2024

Since April 1, 2024, DAS did not open any apprenticeship program evaluations. One (1) program evaluation is in progress. There are ten (10) programs with corrective action needed. DAS consultants are monitoring the program to ensure their recommendations are completed.
