3. Other potential exposures

Proposed control measures: simulation, ejaculation outside the body, condom and other barrier protection (including lube), use of cleanable or disposable materials for sets; if those are not used, what can be/are used to provide equivalent safety:

A. for bloodborne pathogens

B. for other pathogens

Discussion should include combinations of control measures that will provide required protection.
