### HOW THE IMR FINAL DETERMINATION WAS MADE

MAXIMUS Federal Services sent the complete case file to an expert reviewer. He/she has no affiliation with the employer, employee, providers or the claims administrator. He/she has been in active clinical practice for more than five years and is currently working at least 24 hours a week in active practice. The expert reviewer was selected based on his/her clinical experience, education, background, and expertise in the same or similar specialties that evaluate and/or treat the medical condition and disputed items/Service. He/she is familiar with governing laws and regulations, including the strength of evidence hierarchy that applies to Independent Medical Review determinations.

### CLINICAL CASE SUMMARY

The expert reviewer developed the following clinical case summary based on a review of the case file, including all medical records:

The injured worker is a 32 year old female, who sustained an industrial injury on August 4, 2014. She has reported neck pain, upper back pain, arm pain, headache, and left shoulder pain. Diagnoses have included cervical/thoracic spine discopathy and cervicgia. Treatment to date has included medications and physical therapy. A progress note dated January 16, 2015 indicates a chief complaint of neck and upper back pain radiating to the arms with associated numbness and tingling, headache, and left shoulder pain. The treating physician documented a plan of care that included magnetic resonance imaging of the cervical spine.

### IMR ISSUES, DECISIONS AND RATIONALES

The Final Determination was based on decisions for the disputed items/services set forth below:

**MRI of the cervical spine:** Upheld

**Claims Administrator guideline:** Decision based on MTUS ACOEM Chapter 8 Neck and Upper Back Complaints.

**MAXIMUS guideline:** Decision based on MTUS ACOEM Chapter 8 Neck and Upper Back Complaints Page(s): 182.

**Decision rationale:** According to MTUS guidelines, MRI of the cervical spine is recommended if there is clinical or neurophysiological evidence of disc herniation or an anatomical defect and if there is failure of therapy trials. There is no clinical evidence of anatomical defect or nerve compromise in this case. Therefore, the request for an MRI of cervical spine is not medically necessary.
