Mr. George Parisotto:

I received your two page "letter" dated June 27, 2023 today (July 12, 2023) along with at least an additional 50 pages (typed on both sides) on paper that probably involved the destruction of beautiful Minnesota trees, costing California tax payers \$10.68 in postage and entitled, "NOTICE OF PROVIDER SUSPENSION-WORKER'S COMPENSATION."

The main purpose of this letter is to **REQUEST A HEARING** regarding the above—though I have missed your unreasonable and nefarious deadline of "10 days beyond the date of your letter (June 27, 2023).

I also wish to let you know in my letter herein that I am somewhat surprised by your very intrusive, bulky, and expensive packet that I had to inconveniently personally to the post office here to sign for and pick up today. This is especially true since I have not been physically (or mentally) in the socialistic state of California in many years. I did obtain a California Medical License about 1981 while training at the Mayo Clinic for additional residency and fellowship training that began in July, 1982 and which was completed on June 30, 1986. This was all completed as a resident physician under the supervision of California Licensed M.D. Attending Physicians and Medical Specialists (although they did provide care to patients in need, I submit that it would be offensive and belittling to refer to them as your "providers." The only reason I am responding to this letter is because it is getting somewhat cold and dark here for a man of my age and I might wish to practice in California. In fact, I am working on getting my license reactivated. If so, I may wish to work on patients with your insurance and I might need to be paid so that I can in turn pay my expenses.

Again, I have not practiced as a physician and surgeon at all other than as a trainee physician between 1981 and 1986 and have not seen any California Worker Compensation patients at all since then. You therefore have no business suspending someone who is not and has not been a provider of California Workers' patients. Please prove to me that I have seen a California patient as a physician and surgeon since June

30, 1986. If you can, I will certainly apologize and we can proceed with your ridiculous game that is costing California tax payers (and I love Californians) extensive costs.

Thank you very much for your time and please let me know how we can reasonably resolve these issues that seem to be bothering you—and remember, we are not living in the Soviet States of America.
