Subject: Adult Film Industry Worker Safety and Health

Whereas, The adult film industry is an \$11 billion dollar industry in the US, and California is the largest center for adult film production with estimated revenue generated in Los Angeles County at \$3 billion in 2003; and

Whereas, Performers in the adult film industry are routinely exposed to unhealthy working conditions through multiple and concurrent sex partners over short time periods, prolonged episodes of sexual contact, high risk sexual practices and limited use of condoms; and

Whereas, Transmission of HIV and other sexually transmitted diseases (STDs), including chlamydia, gonorrhea, syphilis, hepatitis A, B and C, herpes, human papillomavirus and fecal pathogens has serious health consequences for performers, their partners and the larger community; and

Whereas, HIV transmission occurred in performers in 1995, 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2004, and between 2004 and 2008, and over 2,850 STDs cases were diagnosed among 2,000 performers; and

Whereas, Nationally, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) and in California (CalOSHA) require employers to provide a safe and healthful workplace for employees per requirements under the federal Bloodborne Pathogen Standard and Illness and Injury Prevention Standard in Title 8 of the California Code of Regulation; and

Whereas, Despite these requirements, there has been no apparent compliance by the industry and a continued lack of employer responsibility for worker health and safety; and

Whereas, Adult film models' unsafe sex can affect the behavior of those who view them, especially adolescents who learn sexual expectations and practices in part via these media; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That our American Medical Association support legislation that would require the mandatory use of condoms in the production of adult films (Directive to Take Action); and be it further

RESOLVED, That our AMA support legislation that would improve the ability of local health departments and Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) to investigate and control occupational exposures to infectious diseases and enforce workplace regulations in a timely manner (Directive to Take Action); and be it further

**D-20.994 Preservation of HIV and STD Prevention Programs Involving Safer Sex Strategies and Condom Use -** Our AMA: (1) urge the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to maintain the on-line fact sheet and curriculum on HIV and STD prevention education involving condom use and to continue to augment the fact sheet as new information is developed; and (2) issue a letter to Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services to express grave concern that funding, promotion, and institutional support for safer sex programs, including those that involve condom use, not be compromised.
