CLINICAL CASE SUMMARY

The expert reviewer developed the following clinical case summary based on a review of the case file, including all medical records:

Claimant with reported industrial injury on 3/7/13. Exam note from 8/27/14 demonstrates the provider had given 3 Synvisc injections to the knee without improvement. Physical exam demonstrates no knee pain with negative McMurray's and painless range of motion. Exam note 10/15/14 demonstrates interpretation by treating provider of severe chondromalacia with anterior horn meniscus tear. No formal MRI report given.

IMR ISSUES, DECISIONS AND RATIONALES

The Final Determination was based on decisions for the disputed items/services set forth below:

Right Knee Arthroscopic Synovectomy, Debridement Medial or Lateral Meniscectomy:
Upheld

Claims Administrator guideline: Decision based on MTUS ACOEM Chapter 13 Knee Complaints Page(s): 346-347.

MAXIMUS guideline: Decision based on MTUS ACOEM Chapter 13 Knee Complaints Page(s): 344-345. Decision based on Non-MTUS Citation Official Disability Guidelines (ODG) Knee and Leg section, Meniscectomy.

Decision rationale: CAMTUS/ACOEM Chapter 13 Knee Complaints, pages 344-345, states regarding meniscus tears, "Arthroscopic partial meniscectomy usually has a high success rate for cases in which there is clear evidence of a meniscus tear--symptoms other than simply pain (locking, popping, giving way, recurrent effusion) According to ODG Knee and Leg section, Meniscectomy section, states indications for arthroscopy and meniscectomy include attempt at physical therapy and subjective clinical findings, which correlate with objective examination and MRI. In this case the exam notes from 10/15/14 do not demonstrate evidence of adequate course of physical therapy or formal MRI report. Therefore the determination is not medically necessary and appropriate.

Pre-Op Labs (CBC, Electrolytes and EKG),: Upheld

Claims Administrator guideline: The Claims Administrator did not base their decision on the MTUS. Decision based on Non-MTUS Citation Since the primary procedure is not medically necessary, the associated services are not medically necessary.

MAXIMUS guideline: The Expert Reviewer did not cite any medical evidence for its decision.

Decision rationale: Since the primary procedure is not medically necessary, none of the associated services are medically necessary.

Post-Op physical therapy two times six weeks of the right knee: Upheld

Claims Administrator guideline: The Claims Administrator did not base their decision on the MTUS. Decision based on Non-MTUS Citation Since the primary procedure is not medically necessary, the associated services are not medically necessary.

MAXIMUS guideline: The Expert Reviewer did not cite any medical evidence for its decision.

Decision rationale: Since the primary procedure is not medically necessary, none of the associated services are medically necessary.

Post-Op cold therapy unit times seven days: Upheld

Claims Administrator guideline: The Claims Administrator did not base their decision on the MTUS. Decision based on Non-MTUS Citation Since the primary procedure is not medically necessary, the associated services are not medically necessary.

MAXIMUS guideline: The Expert Reviewer did not cite any medical evidence for its decision.

Decision rationale: Since the primary procedure is not medically necessary, none of the associated services are medically necessary.
