HOW THE IMR FINAL DETERMINATION WAS MADE

CLINICAL CASE SUMMARY

The expert reviewer developed the following clinical case summary based on a review of the case file, including all medical records:

The injured worker is a 32-year-old male who sustained an industrial injury on 9/24/09 the result of a slip and fall when his left knee twisted and gave out causing the fall. He sustained injury to his low back and left knee. He currently complains of increasing back, left knee and leg pain. He complains of insomnia. On physical exam, there were spasms in the lumbar spine with pain on range of motion. His activities of daily living are limited. Medication was Ultram. Diagnoses include status post discectomy L4-5; status post left knee arthroscopy; left knee pain. Treatments to date include physical therapy for back strengthening; chiropractic treatments with some improvement; medication; acupuncture. Diagnostics include MRI of the lumbar spine (6/28/13) showing disc protrusion, neural foraminal narrowing, bilateral facet joint hypertrophy. In the progress note dated 5/13/15 the treating provider's plan of care includes a request for MRI of the lumbar spine.

IMR ISSUES, DECISIONS AND RATIONALES

The Final Determination was based on decisions for the disputed items/services set forth below:

MRI without contrast lumbar spine: Upheld

Claims Administrator guideline: The Claims Administrator did not base their decision on the MTUS. Decision based on Non-MTUS Citation Official Disability Guidelines 2014 Low Back MRIs (Magnetic Resonance Imaging).

MAXIMUS guideline: Decision based on MTUS ACOEM Chapter 12 Low Back Complaints
Page(s): 303.

Decision rationale: Regarding the indications for imaging in case of back pain, MTUS guidelines stated: "Lumbar spine x rays should not be recommended in patients with low back pain in the absence of red flags for serious spinal pathology, even if the pain has persisted for at least six weeks. However, it may be appropriate when the physician believes it would aid in patient management. Unequivocal objective findings that identify specific nerve compromise on the neurologic examination are sufficient evidence to warrant imaging in patients who do not respond to treatment and who would consider surgery an option. When the neurologic examination is less clear, however, further physiologic evidence of nerve dysfunction should be obtained before ordering an imaging study. Indiscriminant imaging will result in false-positive findings, such as disk bulges, that are not the source of painful symptoms and do not warrant surgery. If physiologic evidence indicates tissue insult or nerve impairment, the practitioner can discuss with a consultant the selection of an imaging test to define a potential cause (magnetic resonance imaging [MRI] for neural or other soft tissue, computer tomography [CT] for bony structures). " Furthermore, and according to MTUS guidelines, MRI is the test of choice for patients with prior back surgery, fracture or tumors that may require surgery. The patient does not have any clear evidence of lumbar radiculopathy or nerve root compromise. There is no change of the clinical examination There is no clear evidence of significant change of the clinical examination of the patient compared to it examination when the last MRI of the lumbar spine was performed on 2013. There is no change in the patient signs or symptoms suggestive of new pathology. Therefore, the request for MRI without contrast lumbar spine is not medically necessary.
